

Assessing the Learning

The Basics of Assessment

One of the big challenges with projects that have multiple goals and skills to be assessed is determining the best approach to accomplish the assessment, evaluation, or grading that is needed. There are also a significant number of educational philosophies being integrated into our educational system. Whatever your personal preference, most teachers agree that making sure that students learn is paramount. Since the enactment of the No Child Left Behind Act and similar initiatives in the United States, assessing that learning becomes a problem.

Research projects and assignments pose particularly sticky problems. Exactly what do you need to or want to assess? How can this be done efficiently? Who can do it all? Teachers should be working with the research specialists within their school to do some of the assessment. Efficiency demands clear and easy-to-use rubrics by which students, teachers, and librarians can chart progress as well as learning. If you don't have anyone to work with, then you need good rubrics to make your own workload lighter.

A rubric is a tool for grading or scoring a student's work or progress. It puts subjective evaluation on a more objective platform, giving both teachers and students a clear set of expectations and benchmarks. This

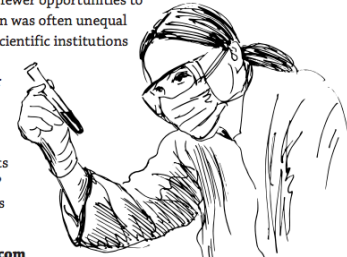
