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What are Research Skills and Why Do I Need Them?

Search

Research skills are the skills of asking questions and finding answers. Life is full of questions. Most of us spend time each day asking questions and finding the answers to them. How much will a new laptop cost? Where is the closest skate park? Who can fix my flat tire? Some questions are easily answered. But others are more difficult, and you may need help in finding the answers.

Research involves locating and retrieving information—answers to questions—and then working with or communicating that information. You may use the results of your research to help make a decision, or you may communicate your research results to others (for example, turning in a research paper to your teacher or presenting facts about your favorite sports team in your blog). Once you learn where to go or whom to ask to get answers to your questions, you have developed skills that you can use all your life. Research skills are useful in school, in your career, and in many everyday situations. Developing good research skills can help you find information of all kinds more quickly and efficiently.

It's been estimated that a week's worth of The New York Times contains more information than a person was likely to come across in a lifetime in the 18th century. We live in an amazing time!
