Planning a unit? Looking for an article that correlates to a specific standard? Follow the steps below to find curriculum correlations.


Log into the desired resource. You can search by standard in the following resources from the Educator Tools section. This section may also be called For Educators, Educator Information, or Teaching Tools.

From *Early Learning*, click "For Grownups" in the top-right corner of the homepage.




From *Kids*, click "Educator Tools" in the top-right corner of the homepage.




From *Student*, click "Educator Tools" in the top-right corner of the homepage.



From *Advanced*, click "Educator Tools" in the Research & Resources menu.




In *Wizard*, as a teacher, browse for drills or create an assignment. Filter by standard along the left-hand side.



In *Discover*, find Curriculum Correlations under the "For Educators" section.



In *Activity Corner*, find Curriculum Correlations under "Educator Information."



In *Dramatic Learning*, find Curriculum Correlations under "Teach with Theater" --> "Teaching Tools."



This will bring you to the available Educator Tools on each site. If necessary, click "Curriculum Correlations," then use the drop-down menus to find the desired standard category and click Submit.

Civil rights are the freedoms and rights that a person may have as a member of a community, state, or nation. Civil rights include freedom of speech, of the press, and of religion. Among others are the right to own property and to receive fair and equal treatment from government, other persons, and private groups.

In democratic countries, a person's civil rights are protected by law and custom. The constitutions of many democracies have *bills of rights* that describe basic liberties and rights. Courts of law decide whether a person's civil rights have been violated. The courts also determine the limits of civil rights, so that people do not use their freedoms to violate the rights of others.

In many undemocratic countries, the government claims to respect and guarantee civil rights. But in most of these
