GRAPHIC ORGANIZERS

Help students organize their thoughts with printable graphic organizers found in the Educator Tools section of *Student*.



5 W's chart

Use this graphic organizer to answer the five basic information-gathering questions.



Bubble diagram

Use this graphic organizer to describe a main idea or topic with details or specific descriptions connections.



Bubble diagram PLUS

Use this graphic organizer to describe two main ideas or topics and compare the similarities and differences between them.



Cause and effect organizer

Use this graphic organizer to represent how events affect one another.



Community

Use this graphic organizer to list people, places, and things that can be found and seen in a community. Or, take a concept and illustrate how it impacts parts of your larger community.



Compare and contrast chart

Use this graphic organizer to compare the similarities and differences between two topics, or to outline.



Concept map

Use this concept map to identify a main concept and levels of subconcepts underneath it.



Cycle diagram (3-part)

Use this graphic organizer to show how three items are related to each other in a repeating cycle.

HOW TO DO RESEARCH
